Message from the President

As the end of another school year draws near, like always, I'm excited about the different rhythm that summer brings, but feeling a bit sad about the students to whom we'll be saying goodbye. There are some incredible kids in the class of 2017 who have made really strong impressions on me. Colin Denzel, this year's Cardinal Bellarmine Award winner, is a fierce competitor on the basketball and tennis courts, and equally as passionate in his pursuit of knowledge and truth in the classroom. Paolo Nguyen, this year's Student Body President, has been a great model of a servant leader. Paolo founded the Sandwich Club, which makes sandwiches each week and distributes them to the homeless, because he is passionate about creating change in the community. I also noticed that after every single assembly we had this year, Paolo always stuck around afterwards to help fold and stack the chairs. It's a job that hardly anyone noticed, but Paolo did it because it's the right thing to do.

At times, it's these small gestures that can leave an indelible impression. I love hearing stories from graduates about a word here or there from a teacher or coach that in some cases changed the trajectory of their lives. Sometimes, when I share these stories with the teacher, they won't even remember – not because they were careless – but because conveying those lessons has been so integral to their work that it's hard to keep all of the stories straight.

This year, we say goodbye to an unprecedented number of retirees – nine in all, totaling more than 300 years of service to Bellarmine. But those numbers don't do any real justice to the impact that they have had on this campus, and the literally thousands of students whose hearts they have touched. It's the countless small gestures that have made that impression.

It's Juan Navarro showing up to every graduation ceremony hours before it begins to hand wipe down every single chair. Or Kim Jones showing her speech teams the meaning of love by rallying around those connected to the team who were struck by tragedy. Gary Cunningham worked countless hours behind the scenes to make every prom a night to remember for the past 30 years. Fr. Bob Shinney, S.J., has shouted "Go Bells!" at so many practices and contests that it has become an automatic association for all of us at the school. Fr. Bob Mathewson, S.J., probably did more to modernize the Bellarmine education during his tenure as Principal than any other prior or since. Larry Rogers spent thousands of hours on the pool deck, teaching his student-athletes that a strong work ethic can help them to accomplish just about anything. Jon Scherbart was incredibly supportive to so many, but particularly to our financial aid students during his early years here, making sure that everyone felt welcome. Pat Taylor has done just about every job there is to do at Bellarmine - bringing Kairos to this community, and providing a home out of his office for the boarders he looked after. And "Wild" Bill Sullivan provided tutoring services to Bellarmine students for his entire career, never asking for a dime from the school in return.

How can you quantify contributions such as these? I don't think it can be done. But I know that these nine faculty and staff members have played a huge role in making Bellarmine the place it is today. They have nurtured hundreds and thousands of students over the years, who are inspired to follow their example, and make a difference by the way they live their lives.

Thank you for your leadership, and we wish you nothing but the best in retirement!

As we wrap up the 2016-2017 academic year, we look back at all that was accomplished during the year and start preparing for the future. I am excited by all that we have planned for the 2017-2018 school year.

Throughout the summer, our science department will be participating in professional development and collaboration in preparation for the launch of Physics 9-a conceptual physics course with an engineering focus that all freshmen will take next year. Carney classrooms will also undergo renovations to support the hands-on activities and collaborative projects that will be essential elements of these new classes.

We are also examining how we might creatively incorporate our makerspace, otherwise known on campus as Bell Labs, into our curriculum. In just the last few months of the semester, it was great to see students sharing their final 3D printed projects with their peers. I am confident that the sky is the limit once students and teachers begin tinkering with the different tools in the lab.

While academics are an essential part of Bellarmine, we know that our mission-based experiences can be life-changing. Over 100 students will be traveling on Bellarmine immersion trips throughout this summer. Students and faculty will be traveling to West Virginia, Tanzania, the Philippines, Ecuador, Louisiana, El Salvador, Mexico City, Guatemala and South Africa. I appreciate the ways in which our students stand in solidarity with communities around the world.

Next year's Summit on Human Dignity will focus on *Understanding Race in the 21st Century*. While we recognize this topic will challenge us in many ways, I am hopeful that the conversations over the course of the year will help us to know and understand one another. Robotics Team World Champions



The Bellarmine College Preparatory FIRST Robotics Team 254, "The Cheesy Poofs," claimed victory in the World Championships of Robotics, the third time the team has achieved the top prize in the past six years. The competition was held April 26 through 29 at the Edward Jones Dome at St. Louis, Missouri, with 36 Bellarmine students participating in the tournament.

Bellarmine's Team 254 previously won the World Championships of FIRST in 2011 and 2014. The most recent win was achieved working with Team 254 alliance partners Team 2767: Stryke Force (from Kalamazoo, Michigan), Team 862: Lightning Robotics (from Canton, Michigan), and Team 1676: The Pascack PI-oneers (from Montvale, New Jersey).

In addition to the World Championship, Team 254 earned a Divisional Innovation in Control Award celebrating its excellence in programming that greatly contributed to the team's success.

"We were competing with 407 of the best teams from around the world including teams from Canada, France, Netherlands, and Taiwan," noted Peng Yav, Bellarmine Physics instructor and robotics team faculty moderator. "Teams are split into six divisions of 68 teams each, where each division operates like its own mini-tournament with qualification and elimination matches. Team 254 first won the division we were in and then competed against the winners of the other five divisions to take home the Championship title."

Additional Team 254 faculty moderators from Bellarmine are Brad Lindemann, Dan Judnick '01, Sean Monroe '11, and Shane Liesegang.

FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) was founded in 1989 to inspire young people's interest and participation in science and technology. The not-for-profit public charity designs accessible, innovative programs that motivate young people to pursue education and career opportunities in science, technology, engineering, and math, while building self-confidence, knowledge, and life skills.

Winter Warmth & Lenten Food Drives

Bellarmine's Winter Warmth Drive, themed Fight the Freeze!, took place November 14-22, 2016, with results far exceeding expectations. Students, faculty, and staff contributed a total of 621 blankets, 246 throws, and 34 sleeping bags, as well as bags full of warm clothing, which were all delivered to HomeFirst and Sacred Heart Community Service, both local agencies serving the homeless.

"This year's tremendous turnout reflects the amazing generosity of the Bellarmine community," noted Anne Maloney, assistant director of Bellarmine's Christian Service Program. "People and programs around campus supported the Drive in so many ways, from printing and proctoring to tech and truck help."

Maloney gave special thanks to the school's AGAPE student leadership for helping to plan and run the Drive, and to alumni volunteer, José Diaz '12, for his oversight of the storage and sorting.

Among the campus groups that contributed to the Winter Warmth Drive were the football, ice hockey, and cross country teams; the Big Brothers Program that brought in beanies and 1,182 pairs of new socks during its Sock Drive; the Bellarmine Mothers' Guild and Dads' Club; and Campus Ministry.

The Winter Warmth Drive was followed by the successful Lenten Food Drive, which resulted in record-breaking donations in both the CRS Rice Bowl and Second Harvest Food Bank drives. CRS Rice Bowl donations totaled \$10, 687 and financial and food contributions to Second Harvest Food Bank was enough to provide over 22,500 meals. More than \$7,200 was raised collectively through the Sanguine Humors lunchtime show, the Bellarmine Mothers' Guild vs. Dads' Club "Give Hunger the Boot Food Fight," classroom donations, a generous Bellarmine Jesuit Community donation, and online donations from individuals and families.

Student Broadcasters

For the first time in its history, Bellarmine College Preparatory's radio station, KBCP, presented live coverage of a national presidential election. On election night, November 8, several Bellarmine seniors provided commentary, predictions, and analysis of the many elections and ballot measures on local, state, and federal levels. In addition, eight Bellarmine faculty and staff were interviewed by students to provide an adult/educator opinion on the outcome of the election, as well as commentary on a variety of issues.

Adam Brown '17, general manager of KBCP, said the idea to cover such an historic event came from the radio program Vitamin B, which featured Brown and classmates Ryan Biland '17 and Peter Boennighausen '17. "From this experience, we learned the importance of impartial media coverage, the changing shape of media in the 21st century, and the many issues which will impact the Bellarmine community in the years to come," noted Brown.

The Bell broadcasters received 2nd and 3rd place for Best Public Affairs Program in the John Drury High School Radio Awards competition, for coverage of the Presidential election and California State propositions 65 and 67 respectively. This apparently marked the first time that a school west of Iowa has received such honors by the organization, according to Wendy Crockett, Bellarmine faculty member and KBCP moderator.

The awards were accepted by Brown at a ceremony held at Illinois' North Central College.



Presidential Scholar




Pravin Ravishanker '17 was recently named a 2017 U.S. Presidential Scholar by the U.S. Department of Education and the Commission on Presidential Scholars. He is one of only 161 students from across the country to receive the award.

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, and recognizes the nation's most distinguished graduating seniors in education, the arts, and career and technical education fields. Application to the program is by invitation only, and is based upon scholastic and/or artistic achievement, demonstrated leadership, community service, strong character, and commitment to high ideals.

Scholars convene in Washington, D.C., in mid-June, where they participate in National Recognition activities, have the opportunity to spend time with fellow Scholars (both alumni and members of the Class of 2017), and receive

Mmersion Control By Max Abisia '17 NOTE: The following piece is excerpted from a Christian Service Program senior reflection paper. It has been edited for length.

On Valentine's Day of 2016, I, along with several of my friends, departed on a plane headed for Ecuador. We would not set foot on American soil for another 10 days. We had all signed-up for the Bellarmine Ecuador Immersion Trip, and I was excited to see what Ecuador had in store for us.

The main purpose of the trip was to expose ourselves to the culture and connect with the people of Ecuador. We helped cook meals, build a house, and clean-up. In the Working Boys Center, I talked with the kids staying there, helped teach them about making candies, and played soccer and a modified version of volleyball named "Ecuavolley" with them.

I loved learning about the Ecuadorian culture; their people, stores, and schools were similar to ours but had a certain lively charm not as present in America. One of the only things I didn't enjoy about the trip was that 10 days did not seem like enough time to truly enjoy the country, although I doubt any amount of time will allow for me to fully appreciate it.

Going to Ecuador has been one of the greatest experiences of my life and I don't regret going at all.

In the hours I waited on that plane on the way to Ecuador, I thought about the people of the country. I wondered if they would be accepting of me or if they would push me and my fellow Americans away. There was a slight "them and us" sort of feeling at first, but as time went on, a deep bond developed between us and the kids, teachers, staff, and other volunteers at the Working Boys Center. Who knew a week of soccer could form such a strong friendship between kids from completely different cultures?

Service has two sides: doing good for the world and finding good in yourself. I feel like I've accomplished both of those. I've helped enrich the lives of a few kids in another country, I've helped build someone's home, and I've given some hard-working people a brief respite from their busy days by caring for the kids myself. I've found the side of me that enjoys serving others and I've tried to foster it into a lifelong trait. Bellarmine has contributed greatly to my view on service and social justice in general. I see now that serving one's community is an important aspect of one's spiritual and moral sides and a great way to have fun and meet great people.

My personality has changed dramatically since eighth grade. Much of this transformation I can attribute to service, especially the Ecuador immersion. I find myself to be more hard-working and diligent, likely because I better understand my advantages and the opportunities I've been given, and wasting my talents would be an insult to those who are not as lucky as I am. Serving others has really helped me learn empathy; interacting with the poor and disabled, instead of outright ignoring them, has opened my eyes to the experiences of those less fortunate than I am. I find myself interacting more with the homeless I see in everyday life, and treating disadvantaged people better than I probably would have had I not done any service. I find empathy to be a lot more fulfilling than ignorance. I plan to find ways to do service in the future, especially in college. It is a great way to meet people and learn their stories while also helping the people that need it most.

Bellarmine Names Kristina Luscher Principal

After a nationwide search and a very comprehensive process, Kristina Luscher was named principal of Bellarmine College Preparatory.

In the announcement made to constituents on January 30, Bellarmine president Chris Meyercord '88 noted, "I am grateful for the very strong work that Kristina has accomplished as the interim principal since June 2015, and enthusiastic about the way in which she will lead the school now that the interim title has been removed."

Having worked at two schools prior to joining Bellarmine's faculty in 2000, Luscher has been an English and dance instructor, and served as the English Department chair, academic assistant principal, and interim principal for the past two years. Additionally, she has helped lead immersion trips, retreats, and choreographed school musicals, and currently teaches senior English.

"Beyond her resume, what has always characterized Kristina's work is her great love for and deep commitment to Jesuit education," noted Meyercord. "Everything that she does is imbued with this sense of cura personalis, considering how she and we as a school can best care for each individual student."

"I am honored to have this opportunity," said Luscher, who is now officially the first female principal of Bellarmine. "The work of our faculty, staff, and students inspires me each and every day, and I genuinely feel blessed to be a part of this institution."

Nearly 100 people participated in the interview process, led by the Principal Search Committee, which helped to determine the school's particular needs at this time, vetting the applicants for the position, interviewing the semi-finalists, and aiding in the discernment process that led to this final decision.

The following, edited for length, is a Q&A with several of this years' retirees who were asked to reflect on their time at Bellarmine for this publication.

What is your fondest memory of your years at Bellarmine?

Gary Cunningham: "I don't have a 'fondest' memory, just many fond memories of my 30 years at Bellarmine. Starting with the 21 years of varsity baseball players that I had the great pleasure to coach (especially my three sons - Kevin '91, Kelly '93, and Patrick '01); to all the talented students that I enjoyed working with in ASB (when I was the Student Activities Director); and all the faculty, staff, administrators, and parents that I have been able to interact with when I ran the Magazine Drive and as Director of the Campus Store."



Kim Jones: "That one is impossible. I would have to go with team dinners. We try to have dinner together after a day of competition when we travel. Sitting down with forty people who are excited to talk about the issues of the day, the opponents, and always their teammates, is about as fun as it gets. Plus, no one can ever figure us out. Who are those guys? Why are they talking about Angela Merkel?"

Larry Rogers: "The most important part of my Bellarmine experience has been the Jesuits. Such Jesuits as Father Reese, Father Wade, Father Cobb, Father Shinney, Father McFadden, Father Thom, Father Clemo, Father Capitilo, Father Drendal, Father Carnes, Father Muller, and many others in their actions, words, and deeds, set an example for the school and community. Whenever they said a Mass, it was relevant to the community and answered many questions that might be thought of. They allowed people to be who they were and supported, counseled, and encouraged students, as well as faculty, to achieve to their highest abilities. In their eyes it was ok to reach for the stars and if you failed, you learned from the loss, and if you were successful, to handle your success with humility."



Jon Scherbart: "After 36 years it is hard to identify single moments, but my fondest memories, and what I will miss most, is mostly the non-academic stuff – goofing around with students and my colleagues, laughing, cracking jokes; just hanging, sharing our lives and concerns. That was most fun and meaningful for me."



Bill Sullivan: "Fondest memory is very easy, it's Kairos. We do many things well here at Bellarmine. We do many things outstanding here at Bellarmine ... but nothing equals what we all do collectively on Kairos. Without Kairos, Bellarmine is just another, good Catholic high school."

Patrick Taylor: "Some of my fondest memories: While the Dean of Students, Mary accepting my hand in marriage in 1979 (best decision I ever made) at the Santa Clara Mission Church, presided by Fr. Steve Privett, followed by a wonderful reception with both events witnessed and supported by Bellarmine faculty and staff friends; living on campus in Berchman's Hall in 1982 as the Resident Hall Director and starting our family with the birth of Bennett Patrick; in 1984, serving as the Director of Student Activities for five years fostering student leadership, student government, intramurals, dances, proms, and and helping to introduce the Freshmen Retreat program in 1985; introducing the Kairos Retreat program in 1991 and nurturing it along as the first non-Jesuit Campus Minister - joy beyond words!; being a personal counselor and eventually serving as the Director of the Personal Counseling team – the relationships created with students and my fellow counselors like Jim Urhausen, Larry Lauro, and Ed Sarrett have sustained me in a very meaningful way; introducing the BCP Roller Hockey program in 1997 as the first 'official' club sport allowing Bells to wear the school colors, play the great sport of hockey, and represent Bellarmine as part of a team, and opening the door for Ice Hockey and Rugby; witnessing my two sons, Bennett '00 and Andrew '03 grow and mature as Bells with support and guidance of my colleagues; introducing the SF Giant's Fan Club in 2008 and as an avid fan sharing in the Giants World Series Championships in 2010, 2012, 2014 – Humm Baby!"

What will you miss most about Bellarmine?

Gary Cunningham: "The daily interactions with faculty, staff, administrators, parents, and students."

Kim Jones: "The guys. I spend four years with them; that means lunch together, after school several days a week, some of the summer. I've gotten to see them grow as thinkers, as teammates looking out for each other, and as leaders. It's fun to see them begin to understand that they can speak for a lot of other people besides just themselves. I absolutely love how they disagree; they can teach adults a lot."

Larry Rogers: "My friends, colleagues, students, and athletes. My friends and colleagues I will miss because they challenge me to be the best teacher I could be. Every day, whether you are sitting around in the morning, at lunch, or some other time, you can discuss the world situation, classroom problems, sports, or anything else you want to talk about, and gain a variety of opinions. The students, because they are open minds who can be challenged to develop opinions, apply what they have read to situations, and challenge you every day to answer their questions, and when they get affirmation, light-up with joy. The athletes, because they come to practice to become the best they can be at a skill, they are willing to work very hard to achieve their goals, sacrifice for their teammates, deal with defeat and victory with respect and humility."

Jon Scherbart: "I will miss the feeling of accomplishment after a good class. I will miss the times when I did things here – took some risks, and got involved with the many important things we do here."

Bill Sullivan: "The camaraderie of teachers and students, of teachers and teachers, of teachers and support."

Patrick Taylor: "I think I will miss the most, the daily interaction with students and colleagues as well as involvement with the many extracurricular events – coaching JV Baseball (thanks Gary Cunningham and Chris Dempsey) and Roller Hockey (thanks alumni dads for your awesome support and friendship) – both have been very special in creating relationships and good memories. Also the consistent support of Jesuits like Fr. Cobb, Fr. Wade in the times of struggle – with the death of my father in 1985 and my mom in 2012, as well as times of joy with baptisms, family Masses, Confirmations."

What do you most look forward to in your retirement?

Gary Cunningham: "Visiting (a little more frequently) my son Kelly, his wife Shannon, and my 2 granddaughters (Jaylin 9 yrs. + Ashley 5 yrs.) in Gilbert, Arizona. Being able to spend more time with my other two sons (Kevin and Patrick), as well. Playing more golf and tennis, and coming back to Bellarmine to volunteer in various areas on campus."

Kim Jones: "Cliché as it might be, I'd love family time. I am thankful to have parents in good health, sisters and families not so far away, great friends, two sons and a saint of a husband, all of whom have heard: 'Tll be there next time.' I'd like to attend school in the fall. When Jeff retires, we'd like to travel. I'll be helping in speech and debate, both at Bell and for the league as a whole. I may be coaching 4th graders in speaking, as well. Violet, my granddaughter, and I think each other are hilarious. We're going to spend a LOT of time together."



Larry Rogers: "For the first time in my life not having to answer to bells that begin a period or end one. The ability to do anything I want without time restraints or limits. Spend time working out and being with my friends."

Jon Scherbart: "I am looking forward to have time not so rushed, and not having all the pressure to be ready for the next semester, or for Monday, or just the next class. There is nothing really that I am not doing now that I was waiting for retirement. I will just have more time to do what I already like doing. But I still will explore some new things too; always time to grow more."

Bill Sullivan: "I'm looking forward to putting into action the tenets of advanced placement environmental science. I plan on working for the Cabrillo Unified School District in Half Moon Bay as a substitute teacher, where I will put my car in the garage and it will never go anywhere because everything is out there for me and I'm a great walker."

Patrick Taylor: "I look forward in retirement to spending more time with Mary, traveling to see more of my adult children - Bennett and his wife Aleksandra, Andrew in the Philippines, and McKenzie and her mate, Ryan, in Woodbridge, Virginia - it would be really nice to have some grandkids soon!"

Do you have a personal philosophy by which you live your life and/or by which you have served the Bellarmine community?



Gary Cunningham: "I try to be a kind and caring person, a man for and with others, a loving dad/grandfather, and a good friend. I really like (and try to follow) the opening verse of Carole King's song "Beautiful": 'You've got to get up every morning with a smile on your face and show the world all the love in your heart ..."

Kim Jones: "I have had the words of former Superior General Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, S.J. on my wall for the longest time. 'Mediocrity has no place in Ignatius' world view. He urges us to work for the Greater Glory of God because the world desperately needs men and women of competence and conscience who generously give of themselves for others.' I tell the guys to work hard because we need leaders in every industry and every profession who remember that democracy and justice rely on an exchange of ideas, not a battle of words. If they settle for less than their best, they won't be those leaders and the voices of these men of competence and compassion will be lost."

Larry Rogers: "My life has been lived by values I learned from my parents, coaches, and teammates. To work hard, be honest, give everything you have, always be on time, support and work with your teammates, and respect all opponents and situations. If you can do all those things, good things will happen and if not, you will learn something about yourself and the situation. Failure is not a bad thing, it is another chance to succeed and learn."



Jon Scherbart: "The main thing is to not live in the world of 'if only,' and try to enjoy the moment as it is happening. Not always be saying, 'I will be happy when... or if...' and we put all these impossible conditions on our happiness. Don't take yourself too seriously; laugh a lot. I think also, we tend to judge ourselves, compare ourselves. We each have our own unique gifts and touch people's lives in our own way, so be grateful for your own gifts."

Bill Sullivan: "What really typifies me best is the education, along with the spirituality, of the long, individually-directed Ignatian retreat, that gives me my impetus: comprehensive world view. Because that's what Jesuit is: meditation in action, reflection in action. And I try to lead my life that way."

Patrick Taylor: "Much is expected from those to whom much has been given.' Luke 12:49. As I leave Bellarmine, I will take with me memories that have filled my heart with gladness. I will never forget the countless students and families and their positive impact on my life, as well as the love presented in friendship from my colleagues, all members of the Bellarmine community, and especially the Jesuit community. Most of all, I thank our students, past and present, who have provided me with much hope with their positive spirit and compassion as part of the Bellarmine brotherhood. I thank God for all these gifts!"

Professional actor Ryan Vasquez '10, currently performing in San Francisco in the national touring company production of the Tony-Award winning musical "Hamilton," returned to Bellarmine



Vasquez spoke to students in two acting classes, then engaged in a captivating lunchtime session held in the Sobrato Center for Humanities and the Arts, moderated by Theatre Arts faculty member, Russ Marcel '91.

Vasquez has extensive Broadway credits, including roles in "Waitress," and "Wicked." While at Bellarmine, he starred in many of the school's productions ("West Side Story," "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Bat Boy," "Arcadia," "Urinetown," "The Foreigner"). He was also a championship member of the speech and debate team, a member of Bellarmine's improvisational comedy group, Sanguine Humours, and performed in Bellarmine's Summer Alumni Theatre production of "The 24th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee."

He credits his Bellarmine education for preparing him well for the rigors of acting. "The harder you study for anything, the more you'll know it," he told students, adding that he learns things "so much faster" because of his Bellarmine training.

To earn his role with the "Hamilton" company, he had to learn 150 pages and 25 songs, never having seen the show previously. "I've never studied for anything harder in my life, except at Bellarmine," he said.

Following the San Francisco engagement, Vasquez and "Hamilton" are scheduled for a run in Los Angeles beginning in August.



Bestselling Author Gregg Hurwitz '91 **Meets with Students**

Critically acclaimed writer Gregg Hurwitz '91, a New York Times and international bestselling author of 17 novels, returned to Bellarmine on January 24, where he reflected on his high school years and shared advice with current students.

Hurwitz is a prolific writer whose works include novels, screenplays, and comics. His books have been nominated for numerous awards, shortlisted twice for best novel of the year by International Thriller Writers, nominated for The Crime Writers' Association's Ian Fleming Steel Dagger, chosen as feature selections for all four major literary book clubs, honored as Book Sense Picks, nominated for the Galaxy National Book Award, and published in 30 languages.

"My biggest influence was at Bellarmine, for sure," Hurwitz told students gathered in the school's Leontyne Chapel on campus during a lunchtime question and answer session. "Here I fell in love with English," said Hurwitz, praising the Bellarmine English department and calling it "as good as the English departments I went through at Harvard and Oxford."

Hurwitz cited "The Great Gatsby" by F. Scott Fitzgerald, "The Sound and the Fury" by William Faulkner, "The Things They Carried" by Tim O'Brien, and "Red Dragon" by Thomas Harris as the four most important works that have influenced him. "If you love novels, read 1,000 of them," he told the students, while also advising them to "write about the thing that you love and that you have to write."

With all his success in a variety of mediums, Hurwitz encouraged students to be true to themselves and to not sell-out. "There is nothing but moral decisions ... it's really about listening to yourself. Make your choices based on what you love ... That's where you're going to be exceptional, and all of the logistics will take care of itself."

"The Book of Henry," a film from Hurwitz's first original screenplay, was scheduled for release June 16.

After graduating from Bellarmine, Fr. John Baumann, S.J., entered the Society of Jesus. In 1972, he founded PICO (People Improving Communities through Organizing). Its mission is to develop leaders through faith institutions who exercise their power to build a more just and equitable society. Baumann gave credit to his Jesuit education, which began at Bellarmine, for leading him "to pursue a ministry that changed my life forever." Working with some 1,200 religious congregations from 35 different traditions, PICO has a strong record of bringing an organized and strategic faith voice into fights over issues critical to working people.

At Bellarmine, Dave Gaggero won a total of six individual CCS championships, and seven relay championships in swimming. He was a member of four swimming and three water polo championship teams, and a state water polo championship team. "I learned so many life lessons in the pool and in the classroom," Gaggero said in his acceptance remarks, adding that his Bellarmine experience set "a great foundation for who I am today." His good works include helping under-resourced communities in Oakland, and now his home of Atlanta, to have access to top-notch swimming programs.

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Viet Thanh Nguyen acknowledged many Bellarmine faculty members for having shaped his literary career. "I have to credit Bellarmine with so many things ... to this day I credit my belief in social justice in all realms to my Jesuit education." Nguyen, the Aerol Arnold Chair of English and professor of English and American Studies and Ethnicity at USC, has authored four books. His novel, "The Sympathizer", won the 2016 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction. His book, "Nothing Ever Dies: Vietnam and the Memory of War", was a finalist in non-fiction for both the National Book Critics Circle Award and the National Book Award.

More than 300 guests, including San Jose mayor Sam Liccardo '87 and former mayor Tom McEnery '63, were on hand to witness the Hall of Fame inductions on the Bellarmine campus, with the awards ceremony taking place in the Main Stage Theatre of the Sobrato Center for Humanities and the Arts, followed by a dinner in the Samuel A. Liccardo Center. Longtime Bellarmine faculty member Tom Alessandri '69 was the emcee; and the awards were presented by the school's president, Chris Meyercord '88.

So, what does that mean from the planned giving perspective? Well, to my mind, that wonderful relationship between benefactor and beneficiary can be brought to bear when your generosity enables us to continue the work we do, both inside and outside the classroom, to form the young men who spend four formative years on our campus. Historic Relay

Members of the Bells track team made history on April 28, as Bellarmine became the first school in California and west of Ohio to win the High School Boys Distance Medley Relay at the Penn Relays.

The Penn Relays is the oldest and largest track and field competition in the United States, hosted annually since 1895 by the University of Pennsylvania at Franklin Field in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Following the historic race, coach Patrick McCrystle conveyed, "Standing down on the infield after the race, looking up at one of the most historic venues in track in the world, realizing that we are the first western team to ever win, that was pretty cool!"

As described by McCrystle, Meika Beaudoin-Rousseau '18, who competed despite being ill at the time, was knocked sideways after 200 meters, got spiked in the foot, and somehow managed to stay upright and fight his way to a 3:11.42 for the opening leg, the 1200 meters/3 laps. "He handed off to Tommy Rocha '17, who ran his fastest leg of the year, 50.41 in the 400," noted McCrystle. Ben Micallef '17 gained the Bells two spots during his 1:54.84 800 meter leg, and Alex Scales '18 took the baton in 5th, about 70 meters behind the leader. "Alex's last 200 will stay with me as one of the more stirring efforts I have seen by a Bell," said McCrystle.

McCrystle had high praise for his runners, saying, "I'm very proud of them. What it means to be here in this stadium at this meet and to run like that, it's by far and away the coolest thing I've been associated with as a coach."



Andrew Ton '17 is among only 32 players nationwide to be named to the second United States Tennis Association (USTA) Junior Leadership Team, which recognizes the finest U.S. junior tennis players who exhibit leadership, sportsmanship, and character on and off the court. He is also one of two recipients of the prestigious 2017 Bill Talbert Junior Sportsmanship Award from the USTA, recognizing outstanding sportsmanship displayed in tournament play. At Bellarmine, Andrew, who has been ranked among the Top 150 18-and-under players in the USTA's national rankings, was a captain, three-time Team MVP and WCAL First Team selection. Capping off Andrew's honors this year was his receiving Bellarmine's Robert Fatjo (Sportsmanship) Award, "presented to that student who has contributed significantly to Bellarmine Athletics through his leadership, example, and achievements on the field of competition. His leadership and example must also be evident in the Bellarmine community at large. He is also honored for the ideals of service and cooperation that Bellarmine hopes to inculcate in all its athletes."







In Memoriam,



Fr. John Leo Flynn, S.J., passed away on October 11, 2016, at the age of 83. Fr. Flynn was born in Santa Monica, May 24, 1933. He attended Loyola High School, Los Angeles, where he lettered in football and tennis. After graduation, he entered the Jesuit novitiate at Los Gatos in 1951. He taught Latin and coached football and baseball at Loyola High, 1958-61, and made his theology studies at Alma College, Los Gatos, 1961-65. He was ordained a priest in Blessed Sacrament Church, Hollywood, on June 10, 1964. A year of teaching theology and counseling students at St. Ignatius High School, San Francisco, was followed by stints as Vice-Principal at Bellarmine College Prep (1967-70) and Jesuit High School, Sacramento (1970-73). He returned to Bellarmine in 1973, where he was to spend the rest of his active ministry. He served as director of admissions, 1973-79, teacher of Latin, and assistant in Campus Ministry until 2005. He left the classroom that year but continued his work in Campus Ministry until 2008, when he retired to Sacred Heart Jesuit Center in Los Gatos.

Fr. Flynn will be remembered as being friendly and gregarious, and his colleagues found him to be a true and inspirational Jesuit who was willing to volunteer for less desirable assignments in the community.

Upon learning of the death of Fr. Flynn, Thomas Flowers, S.J. '02, studying in Rome, wrote the following remembrance and poem, which we gratefully publish with his permission.



It could have been Thursday, Another quip, another grin, I might have been Polite and then forgotten

But I remember Because that was when Fr. Flynn invited me Into the rest of my life

Playfully, as was his way, Eyes alight With mischief And warmth

As he assured me Without great deeds, With no holy word

That it was being A member of Your least Society

That made his life Make sense, That made exquisite The ordinary.

Reflections on John Flynn, S.J. by Thomas Flowers, S.J.

John Flynn was my Latin teacher for two years at Bellarmine. Somewhere in the middle of my junior year, I stopped by his classroom after school to ask a question about the homework. After he answered, he reached under his podium and pulled out a tri-fold brochure with a bunch of smiling Jesuits on the cover. "Have you ever thought about being a Jesuit?" he asked me. The question terrified me. My answer was no, and all I really wanted was to get out of his classroom as quickly as I could. But before I could cobble together something politely dismissive to say, he held up his hand, "You don't have to answer right now. But what I want you to do is take this brochure home. Put it under your pillow. Sleep on it." I took the brochure from his hand and hurried away. I didn't put the brochure under my pillow. I didn't sleep on it. I prayed he would never bring the subject up again.

I wrote to John the week I entered the Jesuit novitiate, six years later. I still remember the opening words of the card he wrote me in response: "Woo-hoo! There is a God! And he listened!" A lot had happened in those six years, and I had thought about entering the Jesuits off and on over the years. But when I was ready, after all that I thought and agonized over, the reason I entered was simple. When I looked back at John Flynn and other Jesuits I had met at Bellarmine as a high school student, there was something about them. John was not my best teacher. I did not, then, know him in any traditional "priestly" capacity: he taught me Latin, and we had never talked about anything spiritual. But everything John did, he did as a Jesuit. I knew that. It was obvious. It radiated off of him. There was this unity about him—this centeredness, this delight in being who he was, in loving his students, in doing what good he could do. And so, when I decided to enter the Jesuits, I did it because I wanted what he was having.

I lived in the same community with John for two months when I was a novice. I was missioned for one of my novice experiments to live and work at Sacred Heart Jesuit Center in Los Gatos, where John had recently moved because of health problems. It was a true privilege for me to get to know John as a brother Jesuit. I got to hear about his prayer and his joys, his past and his hopes, and so I was able to experience his humanity in ways I couldn't have as a student. And I remember so vividly the times when he would tell a nurse or a guest or another Jesuit—"You see this young man here? Who do you think inspired him to enter the Jesuits?"

John took great delight in my vocation. And that was, and is, an incredible honor for me. Even when I visited him in his room in the infirmary, years later, and he was too tired to get out of bed, he was always so happy I was there. And I was so happy to be there. I was happy to be with John, and I was happy to be with him as a fellow Jesuit. Because all those years ago, when he told me he thought I'd make a good Jesuit, even in my embarrassment and confusion, I felt the power of the gesture. He was telling me that the thing he had devoted his life to, the thing that made him so wonderful, that made the ordinariness of his life extraordinary—he thought I'd be good at that. And he wanted to share the joys of being a Jesuit with me. He did—and I am so grateful.



Jim was a very successful real estate developer in the Silicon Valley and Denver areas, and served as a member of Bellarmine's Board of Regents for many years, also serving as chair of the Physical Resources Committee and then as Board chair. In addition to making a difference at Bellarmine, Jim served on many other boards over the years including Santa Clara University, North Park College, First Covenant Church, and Heritage Bank.

Gerald Richard "Gerry" Graham, Sr. died on January 29, 2017, at the age of 97. He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Allene, and children Gerry R.
